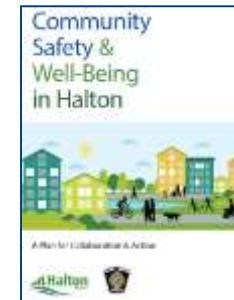

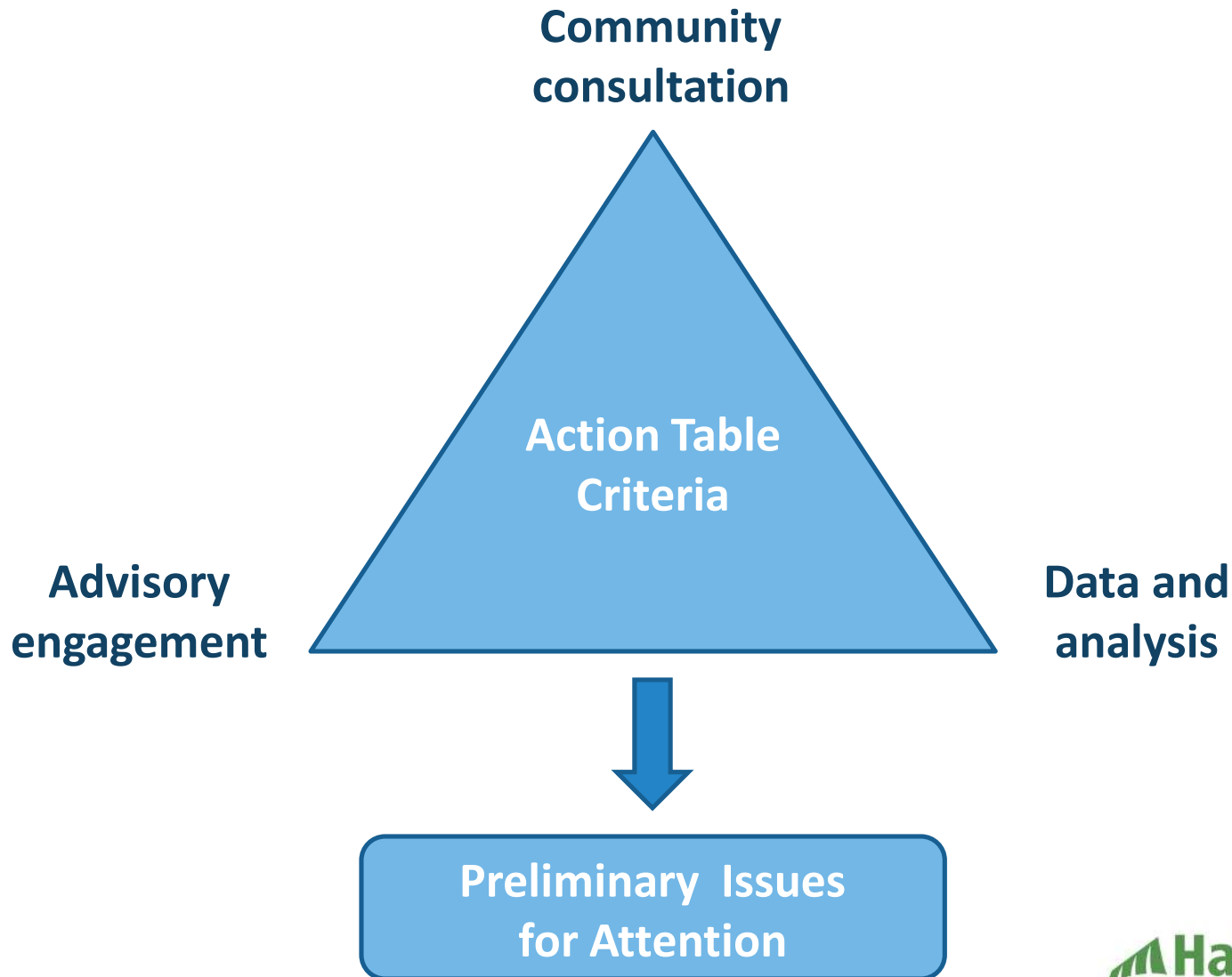

Introduction to Halton CSWB Plan[ning]

- **Living document** – ongoing process of issue identification, planning and coordination
- Consistent approach to respond to **system-level** issues and facilitate **multi-sector collaboration** – 50+ organizations involved to date
- Emphasis on leveraging **existing collaborative processes**
- Built on provincial framework – **upstream lens**
- About “apply[ing] the system most effectively to those that need it the most” (Norm Taylor)

Setting priorities and strategies

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Action tables

1. Enhanced access to mental health services for children youth
 - Coordinated access and system navigation
2. Homelessness supports
 - Implementation of coordinated access model
3. Police response to sexual assault
 - Officer training and recommendations to PSB
4. Support for youth exiting care
 - Pilot to connect youth exiting care to education, training and employment

5. Addressing alcohol consumption

- Resources to support local decision making and development of community alcohol report



6. Proactive response to older adult isolation

- System navigation and community mobilization/awareness



7. Dual Diagnosis among youth

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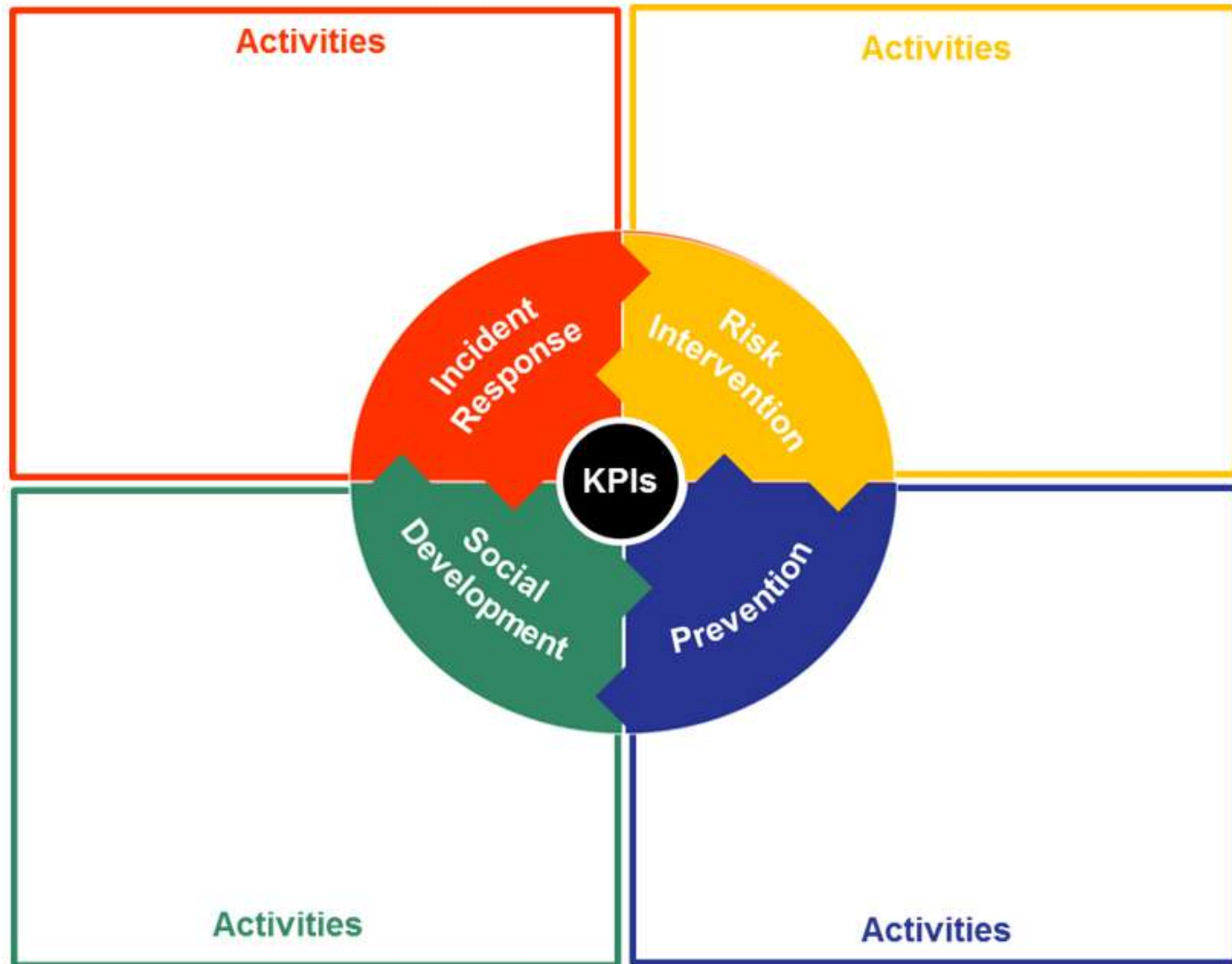


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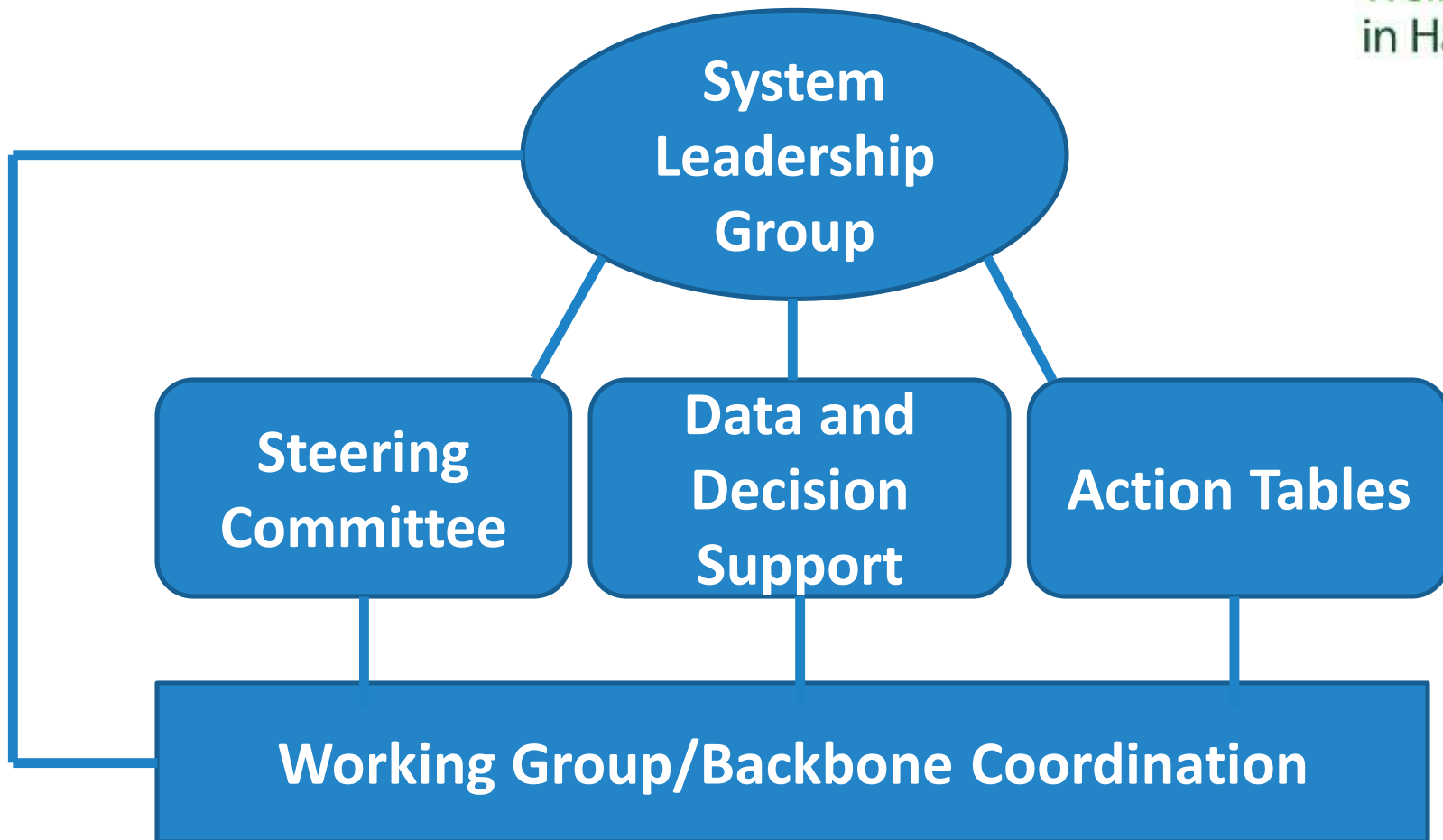

Insights from implementation

- Validates critical success factors identified by Ministry of Solicitor General – e.g.
 - Commitment at the highest level
 - Asset based
- Dedicated backbone/committed resource(s)
- Important role of police services
- Integrate data/planning supports early

Insights from implementation

- Important to set the scope/parameters of CSWB
- Filtering throughout partner organizations
- Managing expectations
- Ongoing communication
- Beyond on an advisory function – Action!
- Opportunity for a more cohesive, less siloed approach to community needs – leverage beyond the legislation
