Demographics

Support desistance: diversionary programme to build trust and support young offenders

Young people in custody are some of the most vulnerable

33% - in care as a child

Remove barriers between police and young offenders

25% -in care at the age of 16

75% have experienced traumatic bereavement - family, close friends.

66%, 16/17 year olds

50%, 16-21 year olds living in the 20% most deprived communities

Reduce reoffending

Polmont Evaluation 2016-18

Do students engage?

- 78% completion rate and rising
- 73% self refer

Do we break down barriers?

- 98 % recommend to peers
- 49% report more positive about police

Do they learn anything?

 77-92% positive learning outcome across all topics
