






Supporting independent, multi-disciplinary policing research to enable evidence informed policy & practice

- Engage in a range of knowledge exchange activities to strengthen the evidence base on which policy and practice are improved & developed;
- 3. Nurture a culture of learning & innovation;
- Promote the development of national & international links with researcher, practitioner and policing communities.



Key areas SIPR is involved in

- ➤ E.g. PCR Local Approaches to Policing grants 2018-2019: Adverse Childhood Experiences; Disclosure Scheme for Domestic Abuse; Drug Related Deaths; Special Constabulary.

What works in linking research, policy & practice?

- Dissemination communicating findings in 'user-friendly' ways.
- Social influence using influential others to persuade and champion use of research.
- Facilitation actively helping to use research, create conditions to support its use.
- Incentives and reinforcement
- Interactive approaches that strengthen links between research, policy & practice communities as most effective way to improve the use of research by public services (Nutley, Walter, Davies 2007)
 - ✓ encourages a two way flow of information
 - ✓ practitioners gain better knowledge of the latest research & helps academics to understand their needs
